

CHAPTER 3 - THE FIVE LIES YOU'VE BEEN TOLD ABOUT AI

The AI Belief Audit

Name what you believed before you can replace it with something more useful.

Five beliefs about AI show up in almost every workshop, every company, every conversation. Before you read the better belief, be honest with yourself about which ones you have carried, even quietly.

Lie 1 “AI is just a smarter search engine.”

Better belief: AI generates a fresh answer from patterns. It does not go looking for pages the way a search engine does.

Lie 2 “AI is neutral, because it is just a machine.”

Better belief: AI reflects the patterns in whatever it learned from. If that material carried bias, the reflection carries it too.

Lie 3 “AI understands what I actually mean.”

Better belief: AI understands your words well. It does not automatically understand your context or priorities, unless you tell it.

Lie 4 “Using AI means using less of my own judgment.”

Better belief: AI does not replace your judgment. It changes where your judgment is needed.

Did I ever believe this, even a little?

Lie 5 “AI is too technical for someone like me.”

Better belief: The people who gain the most from AI are rarely the most technical. They stay curious.
